Also, thank you to Germaine Stoeger who called with stories of Chief Prim and who shared her many scrapbooks filled with Appleton history.


Neighborhood Watch



Year in review:



The Atlas Mill and the OTW

Other than a geographic closeness, the Atlas Mill and the OTW have had many connections throughout their histories. First, the original Atlas Mill was built by Thomas O'Keefe, Sr., the architect for St. Mary's and a neighbor. His house once stood on the S.W. corner of Sixth and Walnut. The first Atlas Mill burned down in 1888.
